



MESSAGE

From the Executive Director



Resilience is a concept on many people's minds these days. During the past 20 years, the world has experienced huge swings in the economy, millions of deaths in a pandemic, and devasting environmental losses due to climate change. Resilience is a characteristic that we would like imbued into all of society's institutions and functions.

But what actually is resilience? The answer is different depending on your perspective. To a physical or biological scientist, resilience is the ability of an entity to survive and return to its original form after being stressed by an outside force. To a social scientist, resilience is the ability of an entity to adapt and change its form after such stressors.

Recently, IAIA's staff and its members have demonstrated both types of resilience. IAIA has adapted and changed to meet the needs of its members and conform to conditions in the world. At the same time, IAIA has stayed true to its core beliefs. Over the past few years, IAIA has been agile in:

- Planning and tearing down IAIA20 without a single member being able to attend in person.
- In 2020, planning and conducting a virtual symposium focused on climate change and biodiversity relative to zoonotic diseases, on an IAIA-created meeting platform.

- Planning and tearing down IAIA21 without a single member being able to attend in person.
- Planning and conducting a virtual IAIA21 and learning how to do it on a new, professional platform.
- Planning IAIA22 as both an in-person and virtual event (hybrid).

Training efforts at IAIA have also been ramped up, including increasing the number of registrants in the PDP Foundations Course, adding online training, and further expanding our webinar offerings.

The IAIA Climate Change Position Statement and its accompanying Action Plan have brought IAIA into greater contact and dialogue with other professions, including the legal and financial community. Our groundbreaking work in surveying the impact assessment community on the effects of COVID-19 on the practice drew the attention of journalists who hosted our "Think Big" virtual forum.

Resilience may be like beauty, such as when Plato said, "Beauty is in the eye of the beholder." So, if resilience is in the eye of the beholder, I believe IAIA has demonstrated considerable resilience and fortitude as we march into the coming years. I hope you will join me in the journey.

MAIN EVENTS

IAIA21

IAIA's first virtual annual conference took place in May. IAIA21 welcomed 1,201 delegates from 85 countries (the most for any IAIA conference ever) with 16 live sessions, 250+ on-demand presentations, daily virtual coffee breaks, tradeshows, and more. The thought-provoking sessions and lively online discussions between delegates made it an IAIA conference to remember. Highlights from the post-conference survey:

- 88% of participants would recommend future IAIA virtual events to colleagues.
- 88% said the value of the conference for the registration rate either met, exceeded, or far exceeded their expectations.
- 96% and 95% said the overall content of the pre-recorded and the live sessions, respectively, either met, exceeded, or far exceeded their expectations.



VIRTUAL FORUM

IAIA hosted a virtual forum, "Think Big: A Cleaner Greener COVID-19 Recovery," in partnership with the Earth Law Center. The forum drew 599 registrants from 102 nations. This six-part series was an outcome from IAIA's Pandemic Impact Assessment Practice Task Force (PIAPTF), and was moderated by Peter Henderson of Reuters News. After five technical sessions with presentations on COVID-19, climate change, and impact assessment from legal and technical experts, the forum concluded with a panel discussion of the path forward.



MAJOR INITIATIVES



PANDEMIC IMPACT ASSESSMENT PRACTICE TASK FORCE SURVEY

The Pandemic Impact Assessment Practice Task Force (PIAITF) completed a third survey of effects of COVID-19 on the practice of impact assessment with 1,038 respondents participating.

The survey found that 50% of respondents reported limitations to public participation, physical meetings, and field work. Respondents (536) reported use of online public meetings at 62%, soliciting comments via email at 49%, online surveys at 38%, gathering input via social media at 34%, hiring local individuals to conduct surveys or hold meetings at 29%, and live meetings at 25%.

An illuminating finding was that 54% of all respondents (912) named guidance on tools for community and stakeholder engagement

and building local capacity (with no significant statistical differences by region) as their top choice in skills gaps and capacity needs. Indigenous community support and Indigenous empowerment was the third most important choice at 37%.

These results show that impact assessment professionals everywhere want help with participant engagement.

Based on responses to the three surveys, IAIA has established an online knowledge hub, organized a set of webinars, collected information on changes to national impact assessment procedures, and pursued other opportunities to support impact assessment during and following the pandemic.

A fourth survey is planned for early 2022.



CLIMATE CHANGE ACTION PLAN

IAIA's Climate Change Action Plan made progress with funding from the Government of Canada. First, to support the energy transition, IAIA is developing strategic environmental assessment guidance to assist countries that are writing national energy plans and sector-specific plans for solar, wind,

hydo, and bioenergy. Second, the legal community is being engaged on approaches, methodologies, laws, regulations, and other legal mechanisms that could be used to address decarbonization and strengthen climate change mitigation.

TRAINING



PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (PDP)

The country representation of the "Foundations of IA" course has continued to expand: 10 countries in 2019, 21 countries in 2020, and 38 countries in 2021. Some of the country representation growth is because the Norwegian Agency for Development Cooperation (Norad) now includes PDP training as part of the funding it offers to developing country professionals, and some growth is due to increasing market demand. Ninety-three students completed the course in 2021.

The PDP course e-learning system is transitioning to a new platform with a professional look. Course registrants will be able to explore and access IAIA webinars and publications from the e-learning home page as well. The first course using this new platform will be offered in January 2022. This new platform will be helpful as we work toward finalizing and launching a social impact assessment course in 2022.



ADMIN PORTAL

With the growing need for remote learning and communications, in 2021 IAIA redesigned the back end of the web site's training section, resulting in a new administrative portal for staff. The portal houses the Professional Development Program (PDP), online training courses (OTC), webinars, training manuals, and the training calendar. The portal allows for more automated content management and better tracking of interest and leads, leveraging technology to both optimize staff time and ensure courses are scheduled based on the current needs and geography of the IAIA audience.

INNOVATION GRANTS

Innovation Grants are a competitive source of funds provided by the IAIA Board to encourage members, Sections, Branches, and Affiliates to undertake innovative projects to advance the strategic direction of IAIA. Between 2-4 grants are awarded each year, ranging from US\$2,000 - \$5,000 each, and the projects must be achievable within a 12-month time frame.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT INTO THE ROLE OF IMPACT
ASSESSMENT IN ENABLING THE CIRCULAR ECONOMY

Desk-based research followed by key interviews helped define questions for a broader survey of impact assessment (IA) professionals for their views on the circular economy, a new area for IA practice. Awarded in 2019 but delayed due to COVID-19, this grant resulted in three outputs: 1) "A Primer on the Circular Economy and Impact Assessment"; 2) FasTips: An Introduction to the Circular Economy for Impact Assessment Professionals; and 3) two webinars launching the documents, offered during different times to expand reach. RESEARCH AND REPORTING ON THE STATE OF DIGITAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT PRACTICE - PERSPECTIVES, CASE EXAMPLES AND FUTURE TRAJECTORIES

Using data gathered via a survey and interviews, Fothergill and Murphy developed "The State of Digital Impact Assessment." This publication was released in November 2021 (www.iaia.org/reference-and-guidance-documents.php) and explores global progress in digital approaches to impact assessment (IA), providing a review of innovation, leadership, and application of digital solutions across the profession. Opportunities for IAIA within the digital IA arena were identified, and Josh Fothergill provided a corresponding webinar on the topic in December 2021 (www.iaia.org/webinars.php).

HAS COVID-19 CHANGED PUBLIC CONSULTATION
PRACTICES IN THE ESIA PROCESS? THE CASE STUDIES OF
THE PHILIPPINES AND ITALY

Grace Eunyoung Lee and Allegra Varriiale of Gaia Consult, Inc. (IAIA Corporate member)

Gaia Consult undertook a comparative analysis of how COVID-19 is changing the public consultation practices in the ESIA procedure. The study compared the Philippines and Italy in terms of their differentiated adaptation to the challenge of ensuring sufficient public and stakeholder consultation process as part of EIA practices in COVID-19. The disparity in adaptation between the two countries largely came from the level of preparedness in their transition to e-governance and overall digitalization of the public consultation in the public policy arena. 
Food security assessment in IA serves vulnerable populations (often Indigenous), underscoring their rights to survival, dignity, and well-being as they face industrial development. This project will provide guidance for incorporating a complete framework for food security assessment within a standard impact assessment framework, as has previously been done within human rights assessments and life cycle assessments. The final outputs will be a primer and a FasTips document, both in English and in Spanish, as well as a webinar on the topic.

DIGITAL ATLAS OF THE DEGRADED MINING LANDSCAPES
FOR RESTORATION THROUGH WATER-ENVIRONMENTFOREST-FOOD SECURITY INITIATIVE (WEFFSI) WITH
LANDSCAPE GOVERNANCE

Emmanuel Amamoo-Otchere (IAIA member)

Artisanal small-scale gold-mining (ASGM) has caused massive ecosystem dislocation of Ghana's REDD+ High Forest Zone. This project will collect data on the five tributary basins of gold-bearing River Pra and obtain feedback from local governments. Using IAIA's Innovation Grant funding, a preliminary atlas will be developed which will contain environment maps of the river basin's local government areas that are relevant to resource efficiency planning, implementation management, and monitoring. Supplemental funding is being sought by Amamoo-Otchere to finalize the atlas.

MAKING A DIGITAL IMPACT


Growing IAIA's audience

Providing digital content to the global IAIA audience has never been more important. As people around the world navigate work and travel restrictions due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, many look online for ways to stay up to date on all things impact assessment.

IAIA worked in 2021 to continue to provide key resources to help impact assessment professionals stay informed, trained, and at the leading edge of impact assessment. For IAIA to best serve the global impact assessment community, it is important to see continued increases in reach and following so no one is left in the dark. In 2021, IAIA was able to achieve this goal with growth on the LinkedIn, Twitter, and Facebook platforms.

By taking advantage of a Google Ads Grant, IAIA generated 8860 ad clicks to the IAIA website in 2021.

Additionally, over 118,000 people viewed IAIA ads when using Google, a 24% increase from 2020. According to Google Analytics, in 2021, 44,565 users visited the IAIA website, a 35% increase from 2020. IAIA's e-news list also grew in 2021 to 14,298 subscribers, a 7% increase from 2020.

TREASURER'S REPORT



While effects of the pandemic continued into 2021, our financial situation has gradually recovered. Considering deliberately how to hold IAIA21 in Spain after being postponed from 2020, we ultimately had to convert to a fully virtual conference. Some IAIA20 delegates applied their registration fees to IAIA21 and received a partial refund due to the lower virtual IAIA21 fee, and some canceled their registrations altogether. Events revenue increased from 2020 because a meeting was actually held in 2021 and the fees held over from IAIA20 could finally be realized. IAIA applied in January for a second round of funding from the US government's Paycheck Protection Program. We received \$117,000 as a loan, but because IAIA met certain requirements, qualified for 100% forgiveness in August.


Regarding 2021 income, membership fees and Professional Development Program (PDP) revenue each increased 11% over 2020. Event revenue recovered from \$69,000 to \$290,000, although it was still around 25% of an ordinal in-person conference. Although IAPA royalties appear to have increased significantly in 2021, there was a timing issue in 2020 causing some royalties not to be recognized in that year.

For 2021 expenses, we reduced some items including direct event expenses, marketing expenses, and non-conference travel and meetings, while PDP expenses increased. Payroll expenses decreased because an employee resigned in November, and IAIA hired a full-time replacement in January 2022. In total, net income rebounded from the 2020 deficit to a gain of \$57,000. This is mainly because the deficit of net ordinary income was reduced and other income, including stock market and security funds, was slightly increased.

IAIA's 2021 rate of return on investments was 18%. This was well functioned for an account that was split 60% equity and 40% fixed income. To maintain cash flow with reduced conference registration fees, IAIA liquidated \$430,000 of mutual fund investments in 2021. Still, that did not dip into IAIA's Financial Sustainability Fund which maintains its balance of \$1,335,000. While the total assets are staying around 2 million USD, these have been decreasingly slightly in recent years. This is mainly because we have had serious years due to COVID-19 issues. We hope the situation will be getting better and our financial conditions will continue to improve.

IAIA conducted its second organization-wide audit in 2021. The firm Eide Bailly LLP completed the audit of the 2020 statements in November 2021. While for almost 40 years our financials were "reviewed," the process of an "audit" is a much more rigorous procedure. The audit resulted in a final set of financial statements, as well as a governance letter and internal control letter to the Board. The audit was very positive in confirming the representation of our 2020 financials. Our 2021 financials that are included in the annual report will be audited later in 2022.
